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The “Arches hen dish” might be from Walther 1904

Dear Siegmar,

I will answer you about the “Arches hen dish” you show in your picture. I wish that I had more definite information about that Arches hen dish. It is **NOT from Streit.**
I have reasons to believe that it might be Walther. I will explain why.

On [page 173 in my book](#), at the top left side of that page, there is a picture from the [1904 Walther catalog, page 8](#) (PK 2000-3, page 4). Please note the **hen dish #201** on the top left side of the catalog page. If one expands the picture of this hen dish, it appears to have **molding on top of the base rim**. The **head, including the detail of the comb**, are the same as the Maker Unknown Arches hen. The design on the **sides of the base** are also the same. I do not know the size of this hen dish but it appears to be large enough, compared to the other

glass items pictured, to be the size of the Arches hen: 6.75 inches [17 cm]. (Frank Chiarenza describes the “Arches hen dish” in his book, *The Milk Glass Book*, on page 60, #114.)



Now, if we look at the [1931 Walther catalog](#) (PK 2003-2, page 37) **note item #22133**. This hen dish appears smaller than the one in the 1904 catalog, but if one can expand that picture greatly, you will see that there appears to be **molding on top of the rim of the base**. If

it does have this molding, it would lend credence to the larger hen in the 1904 catalog, #201, also having this molding.

These are my reasons for speculating that the hen with the arches molded on top of the rim of the base might be from the Walther factory.

It would help if we knew the size of the #201 hen dish pictured in the 1904 Walther catalog. It would also help if we knew what the bottom of the base of the #201 hen dish looked like.

In the **March 1996 issue of Opaque News, Joe Morin talks about this hen with the arches** on the top of the rim of the base. He has no information to add other than the size of the one he has and his speculation that it might be French.

I agree with you that the hen with arches was **made sometime between 1900 and 1914**. The fact that the owner says it might come from Bohemia means nothing since glass items are sold everywhere.
